American Women's Giving Circle and the


Global Fund for Children.




### **Financials**

Her relationship with her parents has improved dramatically, and she is no longer in trouble with the law. She is holding down a full-time job at a restaurant!

Tiffany is a 19 year old autistic survivor. She has struggled with drugs, alcohol, and mental health issues in the past. In 2014, Tiffany worked hard to stay on her meds, to attend Narcotics Anonymous meetings, and to build positive relationships. She has now started community college!
